My Windows Won't Boot! Why???

Your hard drive had an intermittent failure
A Windows upgrade failed
A nasty virus took over your PC
You deleted something you shouldn't have
Something else...

Repair & Recovery Disks

Creating these disks will vary from Vista/7/8 In General...

- A repair disk will allow you to BOOT from it and fix corrupted Windows files
- A recovery set of disks will RESET your hard drive to factory fresh... you will lose EVERYTHING

Repair & Recovery

Always try a repair first

 you'll need to force your PC to boot off of the CD drive. F2, F10, F12 during startup

Then do a recovery because it will wipe your hard drive clean

And, it will take HOURS...

Start > Control Panel > (view by large icon)

Backup and Restore >

Create a system repair disk

Create a set of Recovery Disks

Windows 7:

Start > Control Panel > (view by large icon)

Backup and Restore >

Create a system image

(select On One or More DVDs)

Windows 8 Repair Disk

It's very different. Gee... what a surprise Control Panel > System and Security > File History > Windows 7 File Recovery > Create a system repair disc

Windows 8 Recovery Disks

Control Panel > Recovery
Check the box "Copy the Recovery Partition
from the PC to the Recovery Drive."

(you need 16GB+ dedicated USB flash drive)

Windows Keyboard Shortcuts

Long long ago, most people (like me) did not have a mouse when they first got Windows

I learned this stuff in the mid 80's on Windows 1.1 on a clunky Compaq luggable laptop.



How Cool is THAT!!!!

Windows system key combinations

F1: Help

CTRL+ESC: Open Start menu

ALT+TAB: Switch between open programs

ALT+F4: Quit program

Windows Logo+L: Lock the computer (without using CTRL+ALT+DELETE)

Windows Program Combinations

CTRL+Z: Undo

CTRL+X: Cut

CTRL+C: Copy

CTRL+V: Paste


CTRL+B,U,I: **B**old, <u>U</u>nderline, *I*talic

Sharpening 101


I learned all this stuff at the North Bennet St furniture school in Boston in 2003-2005.

Using a Microscope...



What the Honing Stick/Steel/Strop is Really Doing



Folding over a tiny burr. This has to be removed with **GENTLE** stropping


Tips for Keeping Your Knives Sharp

- 1. Sharpen Often (duh)
- 2. Use only wood cutting boards
- 3. Cut your steak at an angle
- 4. Dull the tip before the middle
- 5. Use dedicated tools
 - a. a 6" chef knife for most kitchen cutting
 - b. a special roast carver
 - c. a 3" paring knife

"D" or Scalloped Grind Knives

Stay sharp MUCH longer But can't be resharpened. So buy cheap.
